




- Six distinct districts

 - Permits include: Outdoor Seating,
 Pushcarts, Street Performers
 - Liaison role to the nightlife industry


Hospitality Rounds

HIPE: Hospitality Industry Preparedness Education

- Launched in 2023
- Proactive, free education session for hospitality owners, managers, workers
- Sessions: emergency preparedness, harm reduction, NC ABC, noise ordinance and nightlife permit
- Modeled after NYC's NITE School




Midnight Messages

- Glenwood South etiquette campaign
- Posted on BigBelly trash and recycling receptacles
- Digitally displayed on IKE kiosks
- Modeled after NYC's Night Owl messaging




Midnight Messages



Nightlife Permit

- 2022: Took over permitting Amplified Entertainment Permits (AEPs)
- 2024: Nightlife Permit replaces AEPs
- Noise will be regulated with the noise ordinance; the nightlife permit will regulate nightlife establishment safety operations



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Noise Ordinance Changes

- Reasonable Person Standard replaces decibel reading measurement standard
- Violation can be received if unreasonable noise is heard or felt 350 feet from commercial property line during daytime hours or 150 feet from property line during nighttime hours



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Other Community Outreach

- Online noise complaint form
- Listening sessions for new Nightlife Permit and Noise Ordinance changes
- Sit on the Glenwood South Neighborhood Collaborative Board
- RPD Business Town Hall
- Glenwood Safety Meeting
- Neighborhood Safety Meeting



Other Aspects of Hospitality and Nightlife Team



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- Expanded the Outdoor Seating program and established Streetery Permits
 - Using ARPA funding to build streeteries for businesses
 - Using ARPA funding to add murals to streeteries
- Deployed Sip N Stroll, a North Carolina Social District
 - Specific area for open container if sold by ABC on-premise business
